

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT March 23, 2018

People who succeed have momentum. The more they succeed, the more they want to succeed and the more they find a way to succeed. This University has momentum. It continues to find ways to succeed.

During a recent trip to Florida to meet with donors and potential donors to the University, I had the pleasure of attending several Slippery Rock University alumni receptions. I met nearly 250 graduates from various years, brought news of the "U," answered lots of questions and listened to one amazing story after another they were excited to share. Our alumni are doing remarkable things in their careers and the communities they touch. They are great ambassadors for the University around the globe.

The alumni were equally excited to catch up on what's been happening at "their" University. As I shared at each gathering, when I was selected to serve as interim president, I declared that my agenda would be continuity and change. I pledged to lead the University onward and upward, maintaining the momentum that had propelled us forward over the last five years and creating new opportunities to better meet the needs of the region and student interests. Our goal would be to insure that the new president would join a University on the move. And indeed he will.

Our reputation for attracting talented students and offering them high-impact opportunities in the classroom, on campus, and in the workforce—opportunities that lead to personal and professional growth – continues to help us buck a system-wide enrollment decline.

SRU's 15-day enrollment numbers for the spring 2018 semester reflect 8,368 students, an increase of 51 students or .61 percent, when compared to last year's figure of 8,317; A modest, albeit positive position. Graduate student headcount decreased by two students (.17 percent), from 1,172 to 1,170, while undergraduate headcount increased by 53 students (.74 percent), from 7,145 to 7,198. Credit hours generated totaled 112,906.5 as compared to last year's 112,458, reflecting an increase of 448.5 hours (.40 percent).

The University works constantly to make sure we are delivering high-quality programming in the areas that are not only sought after by our students, but by employers as well. We are not only focused on educating, but also on being an institution that is helping to shape the workforce of the future with market-driven programs that will meet the needs of our students and the state.

The Master of Science in Hospitality and Tourism, that I trust you will approve later in this meeting, is a perfect example of a market-driven initiative. This online program will be the first master's degree in the discipline in the State System and was developed in response to the "dynamic and increasingly complex environment in which hospitality and tourism businesses must operate, anticipated industry growth, and the related need for committed, well-educated management."

Pennsylvania, as you may know, ranks ninth in the U.S. in tourism industry employment. Pittsburgh in particular is experiencing a hospitality renaissance. The greatest challenge to support this renaissance, according to Matthew Sterne, a board member for the Greater Pittsburgh Hospitality and Tourism Council, "continues to be the need for talent, and this requires the combination of education and experience."

The University has two additional academic programs in development, a Master of Science in Social Work and an Ed.D. in Educational Administration and Organizational Theory, which we'll be bringing forward for your consideration. Both of these programs leverage our strength at the undergraduate level and meet student and commonwealth needs for flexible, cutting edge degrees.

Along these lines, I'm pleased to report Slippery Rock University has been approved as the first institution in the state to offer the Endorsement for Movement from the Pennsylvania Department of Education. SRU will now offer a 12-credit hour program, through the Department of Dance, that will lead to students obtaining the Creative Movement Endorsement credential.

Great students and great programs demand great facilities. A major enhancement to our learning environment is Bailey Library. A March 29 open house will showcase renovations to the library, which began in May 2017 and were completed in January 2018 at a cost of \$4 million. The renovations include a redesigned entrance and lobby area with enhancements made to T&B Naturally, a café operated by AVI Fresh. There is also a new circulation desk and service point that includes laptop circulation, updates to the library's HVAC system and completely renovated restrooms.

A vast array of technology has been added to the building, including a room for liaison classes with 49 computers and two other learning spaces that now have nine and 10 computers, respectively. Additionally, new projectors and interactive white boards were installed in collaborative group study areas and a new face-up book scanner was added on the third floor.

Office upgrades include a new hub for most librarians, library administration and the Office of the Associate Provost of Transformational Experiences and a new location for the Office of Community-Engaged Learning.

While times and spaces at SRU may change, one thing that has remained consistent throughout the University's history is student engagement. While space prohibits me from sharing all the ways in which our students are helping to shape the community in which they live, I would like to share two examples.

Dream Chasers, a service-learning program, has opened a book of the human condition to reveal stories from the solemn to the sidesplitting but altogether meaningful for everyone involved.

Dream Chasers pairs SRU students with residents at a nearby nursing home for an entire semester. Students record residents' life stories for a booklet they provide them at the conclusion of their time together. The service in Dream Chasers is about capturing people's stories and the legacies they impart. The learning is a question that drives the program: How does capturing the wisdom from the stories of others empower us to write our own?

This past semester, nine SRU students were each paired with a resident at the Quality Life Services' Trinity Living Center in Grove City, visiting with their partner for 90 minutes during seven Saturday afternoons. Students reported these meetings as having a life-changing impact.

Another exciting project is our Rock Star Neighbors program. Rock Star Neighbors partners SRU students with the SRU/Student Government Association Preschool and Child Care Center to provide individualized attention for children from Slippery Rock Area Elementary School who are enrolled in the center's after-school program. SRU students are paired with a child for the entire semester, with the pair participating in activities every Tuesday afternoon for two hours.

SRU students from a variety of majors are vetted and trained to mentor children in academic skills,

social skills and community engagement.

The University embraces high-impact practices that are important to student learning, development and satisfaction, and serve our communities through service and service learning. Research has shown that HIPs can have a transformative influence on students' personal development and educational goals.

Our Honors and Student Leadership Convocation, April 8, kicks off a month-long celebration of student success at SRU.

A signature event during the Salute to Success Month is the annual "Symposium for Student Research, Scholarship and Creative Achievement," April 12 in the Smith Student Center. This year's event will feature 170 participants who will put their research, art exhibits and live performances on display. This year's presenters helped push the four-year participant total to more than 660 since the 2015. The symposium will include oral and poster presentations, live performances and exhibits in the areas of science, business, education, communication, computer science, the arts, history, exercise science, contemporary culture and more.

While these programs are primarily internally focused, the University continues to garner regional and national recognition.

## Included among recent accolades:

- The Slippery Rock University field hockey team recorded the highest cumulative grade point average in all of NCAA Division II to earn the 2017-18 National Field Hockey Coaches Association / Zag Sports National Academic Team Award. Slippery Rock owned a cumulative GPA of 3.71 after the fall 2017 semester, which is the highest team GPA in program history. Under the guidance of head coach Julie Swiney, Slippery Rock has led the country in cumulative GPA five times (2010, 2011, 2013, 2014, 2017) in addition to ranking second in 2012 and third in both 2015 and 2016.
- Slippery Rock University's online Master of Science in Data Analytics degree was ranked among the top 28 online math programs for 2017 by Accreditedschoolssonline.org.
- The University was ranked fifth in TheBestColleges.org's "Top 25 Online Master's in Elementary Education for 2018."
- Our master's degree in data analytics was ranked among the nation's top five most affordable degree programs by onlinecoursereport.com.
- Slippery Rock University was ranked among the world's most environmentally friendly colleges and universities by the University of Indonesia's GreenMetric World University Rankings. SRU was ranked 20th in the United States and 142nd in the world.
- U.S. News & World Report ranked our online bachelor degree programs and online graduate programs in criminal justice and education among the best in the nation.
- We were recognized as one of the top public colleges for scholarship funding by the Student Loan Report, an online resource that "aims to cover all student loan news around the world."
- SRU's Office of Communication and Public Affairs earned 36 national and regional awards from four separate rating associations for their work in print, social media, web and video production. Among these awards were a gold and three silver medals for the design and usability of our website the front door to the University.
