Senator White welcomed public comments from the audience.

Monica Traggiai, student trustee, SRU Council of Trustees (on behalf of Logan Steigerwalt, SRUSGA President)

Good afternoon council of trustees. Sorry that I am not in attendance to give the SGA report myself, and I thank Monica for reading this for me.

It is hard to believe that another year is over. This school year flew by and we are already in the planning stages for next year! Before I talk about next year, let me give you a little recap of the last few months, In the last quarter of the 2015/2016 SGA group, many things were accomplished.

- In collaboration with AVI, our VP of Internal Affairs, Jenna Temple orchestrated an excellent awards ceremony for "rising stars" within our University. It had the highest attendance for the event in a very long time.
- Our Outreach committee along with ARHS. NRHH, and UPB collaborated to put on a
 "Spring Fling" event in front of the Residence Halls. This event gave students an
 opportunity to have some fun on campus and get informed on things that these
 organizations do.
- Because of our university's push for being active, our commuter senators planned a
 "walking campaign". In this campaign, we urged everyone to try and walk at least 12,000
 steps a day and have it electronically tracked. If submitted to our twitter handle with the
 proper proof, students would then be put into a drawing for a fit bit, men's and women's
 athletic sneakers, a heart-rate monitor, and some bookstore gift cards. This event was a
 great success.
- Spear-headed by our VP of Finance Michael Farah, our Finance committee accomplished their goals and had a great budgeting season. A few of the goals are as follows:
 - o Club funding increased from 87 clubs last year to 99 this year.
 - o Provided an additional \$38,834.85 through New Initiative Requests for Music Programs
 - Provided an additional \$26,950.52 through New Initiative Requests for Goalball, Western Equestrian Team, Inline Hockey, Triathlon and Swim Clubs to attend National Championships
 - o Recognized 6 new clubs and organizations with half of them focusing on the minority populations on campus.

This year there were two tickets that ran for positions within the SGA, which was a big push this year to have some competition. The new senate is poised, engaged, and ready to start next year and get a lot accomplished. The new executive board members are as follows:

Academic and Student Affairs Committee (Agenda, Appendix F)

Trustee Matt Lautman chairs the Academic and Student Affairs Committee.

The committee met yesterday at 1:30 p.m., and was pleased to hear an update on the teacher certification basic skills test presented by Dr. Keith Dils, dean, College of Education. This was an opportunity for trustees to be informed about the certification process.

President Norton announced the appointment of Dr. David Wilmes as the Associate Provost for Student Success. David earned his Ph.D. in Education Policy and Leadership from the University of Maryland, College Park, M.A. in College Student Personnel from Bowling Green State University, and B.A. in Psychology from the University of Missouri.

In his previous position, David was the Dean of Student Success, Dean of Career Services and Professional Development, and Executive Director of Career Service within the Division of Student Affairs at Marymount University.

David will join SRU July 18.

Finance Committee (Agenda, Appendix G)

Trustee Breth reported committee activities of the Finance Committee. The committee met yesterday at 2:15 p.m. to review a number of items for action and information.

In addition to the routine items, there was an audit plan presentation by David M. Jacobson, CPA Principal, CliftonLarsonAllen LLP. Trustees were provided information by listening to a sightlines web presentation and information was shared regarding the ESCO/Bond Financing.

Items brought forward for action:

ESCO/Bond Financing Contracts Fixed Assets Service & Supply Purchase Orders SRUF Student Housing LLC

Information items included a monthly financial report, the facilities and planning project list and HR personnel items.

Trustee McCarrier moved, second by Trustee Lautman, to move action items forward for consideration by the full board.

University Advancement Committee (Agenda, Appendix H)

Trustee McCarrier provided the following report. The University Advancement Committee met at 3:45 p.m. yesterday in room 103 of the Harrisville Building.

Gift Income as of the end of the most recent quarter (March 31, 2016) totaled \$1,872,609. Gift income as of June 9th surpassed \$2.4 million exceeding the Performance Indicator goal of \$2.3 million.

Dr. Bucha reviewed The Slippery Rock University Foundation, Inc. Balance Sheet Summary, Statement of Income and Expenses Summary, and Investment Portfolio Summary. Assets and liabilities as of March 31, 2016, totaled \$30,572,117. The market value of the investment portfolio remained static, increasing \$5,007 at the close of the March 2016 quarter compared to the same timeframe of the prior year. A copy of the 2015 NACUBO – Commonfund Study of Endowments (NCSE) was distributed to committee members. The report is an analysis of financial, investment and governance policies, practices, and outcomes at endowed institutions of higher learning and reveals the Slippery Rock University Foundation, Inc. investment portfolio continues to outperform the average returns of similar endowments.

Dr. Bucha provided activity updates on the following topics:

- No Increase of Lease Rates for Students

Ms. Swift updated the committee on development activities, noting travel by Development Officers to California, Connecticut, Florida, North Carolina, and Pennsylvania to provide donor stewardship, cultivation, and discovery. To date, 256 proposals have been presented to donors. As a result of their efforts three new endowed scholarships were created, 16 annual scholarships were created or increased and 355 donors are now Founders' Society Members this fiscal year.

Ms. Swift discussed the Scholarship Luncheon stewardship event held April 2nd, the Rock Football Golf Outing on April 23rd which grossed more than \$65,000, and the 2016 President's Scholarship Gala on May 21st that raised more than \$120,000 for student scholarships. She also commented on preparation for the June 10th Tribute to George Mihalik and associated scholarship, and the Women's Athletic Golf Outing on June 24th.

President's Report June 10, 2016

Several weeks ago I was asked by the Chronicle of Higher Education to describe in 75 words or less what makes Slippery Rock University a great place to work? While never at a loss for words when it comes to extolling the virtues of SRU, this request caused me to really think about and synthesize the elements at the core of our success.

After much deliberation and writing and re-writing my response, I responded:

Five words are at the core of why SRU is a Great Place to Work. "We believe. So we achieve." We believe that everyone who works at the University, no matter what their job title or function, is critical to our success. We acknowledge and celebrate everyone's unique contributions to the University and empower them to think creativily and without barriers to develop new approaches to achieve our goal of institutional intentionality for student success.

As we approach the end of the fiscal year and take measure of how well we have met the needs of our students and the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, it is important to remember that each member of the University community is indeed key to our success. *Together we believe. So together we achieve.*

This has been a transformative year with record-breaking achievements for Slippery Rock University.

Based upon our performance in meeting accountability measures and the continued external validation by national rating agencies, it's fair to say we are a University that is strong, vibrant and poised for new vistas and achievements.

In fact, in a recent conversation with Chancellor Frank Brogan he shared his belief that Slippery Rock University was among one of the strongest institutions within the State System and he looked to SRU for vision in leadership in setting new standards of excellence.

I believe we will live up to his expectations because we have a staff, faculty and administration that has proved it can work with limited resources to develop creative approaches to achieving success

That is not to say the road ahead will be easy. All institutions of higher education are facing challenging external forces that will test their abilities to fulfill their mission. Yet I have no doubt that Slippery Rock University will not only weather any storm, but also serve as a beacon for others to follow.

I am especially grateful and indebted to the Council of Trustees for your continued support that allows us to positively impact the lives of students today and in the future.

Your deliberative review and subsequent approval of several bachelor and master's degree programs submitted throughout the fiscal year have allowed the University to position itself as market responsive and cutting-edge. As a result, our enrollment has grown during a time when other institutions are experiencing devastating declining enrollments. Positive enrollment numbers as you know are directly related to achieving and maintaining a positive budget. SRU's financial situation is one of the strongest in the system. Your actions as a Council demonstrate that our shared goal is to see the University continue to thrive and serve as a leader among our peers.

Yesterday, many of you had the opportunity to tour the Harrisville Building, which houses SRU's new physician assistant program. Both the program and the facility are the result of creative thinking and the "can do" approach by faculty and staff to overcome financial and physical barriers. What you saw yesterday was an academic program that is critically needed within the Commonwealth, is fully subscribed and one that hit the ground running with a hard-earned provisional accreditation.

The facility itself is a great example of staff identifying an opportunity and then acting to optimize the opportunity. As you heard from members of the Harrisville Borough Council, the transformation of the former Har-Mer Elementary School into a venue for SRU's PA program was a wonderful reclamation of the abandoned facility and is a great asset to their community.

Not only are our academic programs serving a great need within the region, they continue to be recognized for their quality and affordability.

- Slippery Rock University's online master's degree in criminal justice has been ranked among the top 45 programs in the country by affordablecollegesonline.org.
- A trio of SRU's online master's degrees English, history and math has been ranked among the top 20 programs in the country by affordablecollegesonline.org. SRU's online master's program in English was ranked 19th; history, 12th; and math, 19th.
- The Bachelor of Arts in dance has been ranked fifth in the country by dancecolleges.com. The organization also ranked SRU as among the top 20 dance programs in the United States.
- SRU's online master's degree in elementary education has been ranked among the top 10 programs in the country by bestcollegevalues.com.
- Slippery Rock University's College of Education has been ranked second in the state by tobecomeateacher.org. Reviewers said, "Slippery Rock University was one of five distinct schools in the state that has surpassed all others. We commend them."

Institutionally, Slippery Rock University:

 Was named a 2016 U.S. Department of Education Green Ribbon School Postsecondary Sustainability Awardee. SRU, which was nominated for the honor by the Pennsylvania Department of Education, was the only institution of higher education in the state to be recommended for the postsecondary sustainability award:

- Was recently awarded a 2016 Healthiest Employers of Western Pennsylvania Award from the Pittsburgh Business Times. This is the second consecutive year SRU has been recognized for its coordinated efforts to change the campus culture toward improved health and wellness;
- Was the lone representative from Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education to be ranked in the Buffalo (NY) Business First's 2016 academic rankings of U.S. public colleges. The organization created a 20-part formula to identify those schools that offered the best educational experiences to their students. It gave the highest marks to schools with highly selective admissions processes, strong retention and graduation rates, prestigious reputations, generous resources, affordable tuitions and housing costs, diversity and economically robust communities.

All of the incredible rankings I've noted above reaffirm the tremendous, high-quality education and learning environment that Slippery Rock University provides.

Those of you that know me know I love sharing stories about our students. Although my 75-word limit answer to the Chronicle's question about why SRU is such a great place didn't allow me to include any stories, I would like to share two with you today that demonstrate the quality of student attracted to the University.

- When Blake Wallrich first arrived at Slippery Rock University two years ago he knew he didn't want to leave with only a diploma in hand. He wanted to accomplish something more, something beyond the ordinary. Mission accomplished. Blake was named a Goldwater Scholar by the Barry Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Foundation, a full year before he expects to participate in an SRU commencement ceremony. A geology major from Pittsburgh, Blake's area of specialization deals with establishing a more defined link between what's going on inside the magma chamber of volcanoes in conjunction to what is visible on the surface in order to better predict the potential for eruptions. Blake is the first SRU student to be named a Goldwater Scholar, one of the nation's most distinguished scholarship programs. Kudos to Blake and to Provost Philip Way who established SRU's Office for Distinguished Scholarships and Fellowships to mentor students through the many steps they must complete to apply for and land such scholarships.
- Kaitlynn Sinclair was just 14 years old when she met the love of her life. However, the object of her affection didn't have thick, blonde hair or deep, blue eyes. Rather, it had 88 keys and a bench seat. The senior music therapy major, who battles performance anxiety, will again find herself on the bench this summer as one of 18 budding pianists from around the world invited to take part in the 4th Dublin International Piano Festival and Summer Academy, July 23-31 in Dublin, Ireland. Her acceptance to the Dublin Academy is the first for an SRU student and for Sinclair, who plans to pursue a doctorate in piano pedagogy; it is the fruition of her dedication and perseverance.

These are just two of the great stories we have to tell. As is my custom, I will end my report by sharing a sampling of the awards and accolades earned by our students, faculty, staff and alumni.

STUDENTS

- Logan Pollman, a senior biology major from Slippery Rock, and Tyler Sheppard, a senior exercise science major from Hermitage, won first place with their total catch of five bass weighing in at 18 pounds, 1 ounce. Their victory earned the Fishing Club \$2,000 and advanced the pair to the 2017 FLW College National Championship. Joel Hixon, a senior business management major from Butler, and Evan Kretz, a senior exercise science major from Allison Park, placed sixth with a 15 pound, 15 ounce catch; while Ryan Kozlowski, a junior park and resource management major from Cranberry, and Nathan Quince, a sophomore management major from Imperial, finished in 10th place with their 15 pound, 5 ounce showing. This is the first time the club has ever won an FLW event.
- SRU track and field standout Sabrina Anderson was named the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Female Field Athlete of the Year for the outdoor season. Anderson, who recently completed her junior athletic season on the track, completes a season sweep of the yearly PSAC field awards after also winning the Field Athlete of the Year honor during the indoor track and field season.
- Slippery Rock sophomore designated hitter Tyler Walters capped off what has already been an impressive awards season by being named to the 2016 National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association All-America Team.
- Six Slippery Rock University student researchers were invited to participate in the 2016 Clinton Global Initiative University meeting that brought together more than 1,000 student leaders from across the country to present their "Commitments to Action" in one or more of CGIU's five focus areas: education, environment and climate change, peace and human rights, poverty alleviation and public health. The delegation of SRU students included: Ashley Beal, an environmental geoscience major from West Mifflin, Andrew Moore, a junior sustainable management major from Eudora, Kansas, and Dale Chappell, a graduate education student from New Castle, who partnered on poverty alleviation; Samantha Marfisi, a senior sustainable management major from Bethel Park and Kelly Ligon, an undeclared junior from Lower Burrell, who partnered on environment and climate change; and Emily Reed, a senior non-profit management major from Erie, who submitted under peace and human rights.
- Chenoa Gregory, a senior art major from Freeport, and student worker in SRU's Office of University Communication and Public Affairs, captured a Silver Award for her poster, "Faculty and Guest Artist Dance Concert" from the National Educational Advertising Awards.

- Five SRU students earned top-three finishes in the 2nd Annual Japanese
 Speech Contest for College Students in Western Pennsylvania. Earning honors
 were: Steven Dobbins, a finance major from Ellwood City, first place (level four);
 Jason Eichenlaub, an information systems major from Butler, third place (level
 three); Justin Kraus, a communication major from Aliquippa, second place (level
 one); Katelyn Mays, a biology major from Evans City, third place (level two); and
 Majerica Rainey, a criminology major from Pittsburgh, third place (level one)
- Timmy Samec, a physics major, and Dan Meehan, an SRU exercise science major, have qualified to represent Team USA at the 2016 ITU World Triathlon Championships in Cozumel, Mexico in September.
- Aaron Onufrak, a senior from Butler, captured first-place honors at the 25th Annual Sigma Xi Undergraduate Student Research and Creative Accomplishment Conference and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania University Biologists annual meeting for his poster, "Release rate determination for metal-diffusing substrates for use in acid mine drainage field studies." Onufrak's project entailed designing and evaluating substrates that leak metals to algae, which can be used for bioassays in streams. Onufrak worked with faculty advisers Dean DeNicola, SRU biology professor, and Michael Stapleton, SRU associate professor of geography, geology and the environment, on his project. Annette Choi, a freshman from South Korea, and Redi Metali, a freshman from Albania placed second with their research poster, "Utilizing live cell imaging in Drosophila cells to identify stressors that induce protein misfolding".
- Matt Hart, an accounting major from Cambridge Springs, and Dong Nguyen, a
 finance major from Vietnam, were invited to present their research at the
 Production and Operations Management Society's Annual Conference. The two
 analyzed automatic vehicle location data from the Butler Transit Authority to
 improve computer tracking of the busses and on-time performance. Faculty
 adviser Roger Solano, associate professor of business, accompanied the
 students.
- David Tini, a music education major from Altoona, earned second-place honors and a \$5,000 cash prize at the fifth annual Student Business Plan Competition sponsored by Pennsylvania's State System of Higher Education. Tini developed "Hot Lips," an attachment to the mouthpiece of brass musical instruments designed to warm the instrument's mouthpiece for improved musical performance during cold weather performances.
- Three members of the SRU baseball team were named to the 2016 All-PSAC Western Division Team. Sophomore Tyler Watlers, Saegertown, earned first team honors at designated hitter; Alex Bell, a senior from Pittsburgh, earned second team honors as a first baseman, and junior outfielder Ty Zimmerman, from Punxsutawney, earned second-team honors.
- Tennis standout Carla Corrochano Moracho, a sophomore from Talavera De La Reina, Spain, was named to the 2015-16 All-PSAC Western Division first team. Nina Barbano, a sophomore tennis player from Pittsburgh, was named to the second team.

- Four SRU softball players were named to the 2015-16 All-PSAC Western
 Division team. Caitlin Baxter, a junior from Butler, was selected as the division's
 top utility player. Katie Baiser, a senior from Garrettsville, Ohio; Megan
 Maloney, a senior from Lauren, Maryland; and Ashley Samluk, a senior from
 Erie, earned at-large conference recognition.
- Paige Kassab, a senior from Meadville, won the PSAC conference championship in the high jump, clearing 1.69 meters.
- Erin Wilcox, a senior from Hamburg, New York, was named to All-Region honors by the Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association. Wilcox had a dominant senior season in 2016 in which she scored at least one goal in every game of the year.
- Cory Brown, a senior from Bridgeport, Connecticut, signed a contract to play
 professional basketball with AS Soleuvre of the Total League in Luxembourg for
 the upcoming season.
- SRU football standouts Kyle Henderson, a senior from Moon Township, and Andrew Huska, a senior from Ford City, were named to the National Football Foundation's Hampshire Honor Society. To be considered for the honor, a student-athlete must maintain above a 3.2 cumulative GPA, must have completed their final year of athletic eligibility and must have been a starter or significant contributor on the field.
- Women's track and field standout Sabrina Anderson, a junior from Warren, was named to the PSAC Winter Top 10 for her extraordinary performance academically and athletically during the winter sports season. The honor is just the latest in a long list of academic achievements for Anderson. A two-time Winter PSAC Top 10 honoree, Anderson also received Spring PSAC Top 10 recognition in 2014-15. She was a CoSIDA Academic All-American in 2015 and has earned PSAC Scholar-Athlete honors every year she has been in college while also being a mainstay on the Slippery Rock Dean's List.
- SRU All-American linebacker Teven Williams, from Huber Heights, Ohio, has signed a professional football contract with the North Coast Heat of the National Gridiron League in Australia.
- Jasmine Bailey, a senior from Butler, was named PSAC Track Athlete of the Year.
- SRU senior quarterback Dante Nania has signed a professional football contract with the North Coast Heat of the National Gridiron League in Australia.
- The SRU field hockey team grabbed a share of the nation's top spot with 19 student-athletes named to the 2015 Division II National Academic Squad. This marks the fourth consecutive year that SRU has placed in the top two of total number of student-athletes on the NAS in Division II.

- A pair of Slippery Rock University students earned top ten finishes at the 2016
 Intercollegiate Horse Shows Association National Finals. MaryEllen Davis, a
 junior public health major from Falls Church, Virginia, finished sixth in individual
 intermediate western horsemanship; while Katelynn Greenawald, a senior early
 childhood/special education major from Burgettstown, finished ninth among a
 field of 26 riders in the American Quarter Horse Association high point rider
 competition.
- The Rocket, the independent, student newspaper serving Slippery Rock University, captured first place in overall newspaper excellence (for publications published weekly or less) and third-place honors for its companion website, www.theonlinerocket.com, from the Society for Collegiate Journalists. Staffers won 21 awards for individual excellence in the competition. The Rocket also captured four Region 4 "Mark of Excellence" awards from the Society of Professional Journalists. The American Scholastic Press Association presented the paper with a first place with special merit award for colleges with enrollment over 2,501 and an award for outstanding sports coverage for its "PSAC Wars" basketball section.

 exercise science, and Joyan Urda, assistant professor of exercise science, have
 authored "Sun Exposure and Exercise: The Good, The Bad and The Behavior
 Change."
- Julie Snow, professor of geography, geology and the environment, teamed with author Jeanine Silversmith on a new book, "The Rhode Island Family Guide and Journal." Snow, a Rhode Island native, drafted all the hiking trail maps in the book. She and Silversmith hiked each of the 43 trails to collect digital spatial data and used satellite imagery to confirm their mappings.
- Aaron Cowan, associate professor of history, has published a new book, "A Nice Place to Visit," which explores tourism and urban revitalization in the postwar rustbelt.





As of April 30, 2016 - 83% of the fiscal year has passed and 17% of the fiscal year remains, although revenue and several expense categories are not recognized evenly throughout the year.

Revenue:

Revenue - Tultion Revenue as of April 30, 2016 includes all Academic Year and Summer/Winter Intersession revenue.

Non-tuition revenue consists of interest income, rental of facilities, cell tower reimbursement, ID card fee, transcript fee, ticket sales, parking decals & tickets, Pepsi funding.

Expenses:

Payroll expenditures include personnel expenditures through April 2016, inclusive of a \$3.9 million accrual for faculty with the 26 pay option.

Personnel costs are not incurred evenly throughout the year, but rather follow the established pay schedules.

Other Non-personnel expenses include such costs as equipment and furnishings, scholarships, library costs, contracted services, advertising, software license fees, maintenance/office supplies, bad debt expense, software, etc.


