Threads 2.0 Advising Guide

The Threads element of the Rock Studies Program at SRU is an innovative approach to general education that encourages students to explore the connections between different disciplines and develop critical thinking skills. By taking four courses across different subject areas that relate to one of six thematic areas, detailed in the following pages, students gain a deeper understanding of how various fields of study intersect and contribute to a broader perspective on the world.

The purpose of the Threads is to foster the ability to synthesize information and recognize patterns across seemingly unrelated disciplines. As students progress through the courses in their chosen thread, they will further hone skills to identify common ideas, challenges, and solutions that span multiple disciplines. This interdisciplinary approach prepares students to tackle complex problems in their future careers and personal lives by drawing upon a diverse range of knowledge and perspectives.

The Threads build upon the foundation laid by the other two components of Rock Studies, The Rock and Integrated Inquiry. By exploring a single theme through the lens of four different subject areas, students develop a more nuanced understanding of the topic and learn to approach it from multiple angles. In today's rapidly evolving and interconnected world, the Threads element equips students with the essential skills of critical thinking, information synthesis, and drawing connections between different fields, preparing them to be adaptable, innovative, and effective in their chosen careers and as engaged citizens in their communities.

Guidelines:

- Thread should be declared by the time a student earns 45 credits.
- Students must take 12-credits from the courses within their threads.
- Students must take at least six credits from 300/400-level courses within their thread.
- Students cannot take more than four credits from any one prefix.
- Students can declare more than one thread but cannot use the same courses to satisfy multiple threads.
- Any course <u>with the same prefix</u> as a student's first major cannot be used to satisfy a thread requirement, even if it is not a course in their 1st major.

Example: A student whose 1st major is HCAM <u>cannot take an HCAM course in a thread under</u> any circumstan<u>ces</u>, even if that course is not a part of their particular HCAM concentration.

• Any specific course required in a student's first major, <u>regardless of the prefix of the course</u>, cannot also be used to satisfy a thread requirement.

Example: HCAM is an interdisciplinary major that contains courses from other programs in addition to HCAM (eg. MRKT, FIN, ECON, HLTH). As long as the MRKT, FIN, ECON, HLTH course is not a course required for the HCAM 1st major, a student can take it to satisfy a thread requirement.

• Students can use any credits from their thread toward a second major, minor, or certificate.

Citizenship and Social Problems

This thread considers the complex needs and demands of different societies. Students will evaluate the effectiveness of policies at remedying social problems, and to see the connections between policies that prioritize multicultural inclusion and the existence of a healthy civil society. Some courses will connect past policies and practices to the ongoing effects of racism, homophobia, misogyny, classism, and/or other inequalities in contemporary society.
