

Rock Studies 2 Program

The Rock Studies 2 Program contains the general education requirements; since some majors prescribe specific courses within each category, use this guide along with the curriculum guide and the My Rock Audit to make course selections in consultation with your adviser. (42 Credits)

| Thematic Threads (select one): | 12 credits including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • one course from each category (World, Past, Present, Future) • six credits must be at the 300/400 level • no more than 4 credits from one subject area | NOTE: Specific courses required in first major, regardless of prefix of course, cannot also be used to satisfy thread requirements. Ex: HCAM, an interdisciplinary major, contains courses from other programs in addition to HCAM (ACCT, FIN, HLTH). As long as the ACCT, FIN, HLTH course is not a course required for the HCAM 1st major, students can take it to satisfy thread requirements. Courses cannot share with 1st major/concentration or other Thematic Threads NOTE: Any course with same prefix as student's first major cannot be used to satisfy thread requirements, even if it is not a course in the 1st major. Ex: Students whose 1st major is HCAM cannot take an HCAM course in threads under any circumstances, even if a course is not part of their particular HCAM major/concentration. Courses cannot be taken in 1st major subject area NOTE: Courses can share with 2nd majors /concentrations, minors, and certificates |

POLICY AND PROCEDURE NOTES:

- Students must earn a total of 42 credits in Rock Studies 2 coursework.
- Students exempted from any Rock Studies 2 category must still earn a total of 42 credits in Rock Studies 2 coursework.
- Students may use Rock Studies Thematic Thread courses to complete a second major, minor, or certificate.
- Pass/No Credit courses may not be used to satisfy any Rock Studies 2 Requirement.
- Students who withdraw from the university and then return are responsible for the Rock Studies 2 requirements in effect the time of their return.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS:

- All undergraduate degree programs require a minimum of 120 credits.
- Thirty of the final 60 credits prior to graduation must be earned at SRU. In addition, individual departments may establish residency requirements for their majors and minors. Students should check with their academic adviser to determine the requirements for the academic program.
- Students must complete a minimum of 42 credits of Rock Studies 2 Coursework.
- Students must complete 48 credits of upper-level coursework. Thirty-nine of the 48 credits must be at the 300 level or higher, the additional 9 credits may include 100 or 200 level courses with two or more 3-credit prerequisite courses (including sequential prerequisites, but not including basic competency courses or exams). At least 24 of the 48 credits must be completed at SRU.
- Bachelor of Arts degrees require language proficiency at the 103-class level. Exemption by placement or examination is offered.
- Students must complete at least 45 credits at SRU to be considered for Latin Honors at the point of graduation.
- Students who wish to earn two degrees must complete 150 credits, all requirements for both degrees, and meet the language requirement if one of the degrees is a BA. Students only need to meet the Rock Studies requirement for the first degree/major.

TRANSFER STUDENTS:

- New transfer students follow the Rock Studies 2 Program requirements beginning in Summer 2022.
- Transfer courses valued as a percentage: 2.33, 2.5, etc. may be used to meet requirements, however, students must still earn a total of 42 Rock Studies 2 credits.
- Students transferring 24 or more credits are exempt from Foundations of Academic Discovery.
- Transfer students must still earn a total of 42 credits in the Rock Studies 2 program, unless the criteria of general education completion is met as defined in the [Board of Governors Policy 1999-01-A The Student Transfer Policy](#).

COMPUTER COMPETENCY:

All students at SRU must demonstrate computer competency through one of the following methods:

- Equivalent transfer coursework or successfully complete one of the following courses at SRU:
 - CPSC 100 - Introduction to Computing
 - CPSC 110 - Computer Concepts
 - CPSC 130 - Introduction to Computing and Programming
 - PE 202 - Technology for Wellness
- Pass the SRU Computer Competency Exam - CPSC 099

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION (DEI):

All students must complete a course with the "DEI Diversity, Equity and Inclusion" attribute before they graduate from SRU. The DEI course can come from any department and can be used anywhere in your degree requirements.

BEGINNING ALGEBRA (ESAP 110):

All students must demonstrate competency through MATH SAT or ACT scores or appropriate high school coursework. If competency is not met, students must complete Beginning Algebra and complete 123 credits for graduation.

READMITTED STUDENTS:

- Students readmitted to the university follow the Rock Studies 2 Program requirements.
- Students with at least 24 or more credits are exempt from Foundations of Academic Discovery.
