2024-2025 Impact Summary



A Bold Vision for SRU Community Engagement

Slippery Rock University (SRU) is embracing its dual civic roles: to educate engaged citizens and to positively impact local and global communities. A robust community engagement strategy enhances student retention, fosters leadership skills, and bolsters career readiness. Recognizing these benefits, SRU has established the Center for Community Engagement (CCE), a restructured and strategic approach to align with the university's Strategic Plan Pillar #3: Commitment to Community Impact and Collaboration. The mission of the CCE is to provide programming and resources that support and prepare civically minded graduates through community-university collaborations.

The CCE will work to amplify SRU's community impact by striving toward three strategic goals: 1) enhance academic initiatives that more fully integrate civic learning and student engagement, 2) empower students by expanding opportunities that enhance civic understanding and leadership development, and 3) grow community partnerships by promoting campus coordination and communication. As such, the CCE will establish SRU as a leader in preparing students for engaged citizenship and community betterment.

For this inaugural impact report, we present data that align with these strategic goals from our essential existing programs, highlight important growth revealed in our 2025 Carnegie application for Community Engagement reclassification and self-study, and present some exciting new initiatives on the horizon. In doing so, we highlight the kinds of impacts for which we are striving in our new configuration. Finally, we welcome the continued input and feedback from campus and community stakeholders as to what impacts are useful, compelling, and yet to be determined, as we work together to chart a new direction for community engagement at SRU!



STRATEGIC GOAL 1: ACADEMIC INTEGRATION

As part of its commitment to academic integration, the CCE supports faculty in incorporating civic learning into their teaching, enhancing student engagement and real-world relevance. The center fosters sustainable community partnerships and develops academic programs that strengthen career readiness and professional growth. In collaboration with campus departments, the CCE also advances the development of community engagement learning outcomes across the curriculum.

The Academic Community Engagement ACE course designation is established to respond to Carnegie findings (i.e. promoting high-quality standards with evidence-based outcomes) and the CCE mission and strategic goals in support of SRU Strategic Plan Pillar #3: Commitment to Community Impact & Collaboration. (CCE creates the **ACE Pathway** as an application process for ACE course designation.

As part of our 2025 Carnegie Community Engagement Reclassification application, the CCE collected and analyzed the most recent and comprehensive data available, covering the 2022–2023 academic year. This data illustrates significant institutional growth in the integration of High-Impact Practices (HIPs)—active learning strategies that foster deep student engagement and real-world application—since our previous Carnegie

application in 2020.

STUDENT PARTICIPATION



Undergraduate students enrolled in HIP-designated courses nearly doubled, increasing from 512 in 2020 to 1.016 in 2022-2023.

FACULTY INVOLVEMENT

COURSE OFFERINGS



HIP-designated undergraduate courses increased from 62 in 2020 to 83 in 2022-2023, reflecting expanded curricular integration of communityengaged learning.

DEPARMENT ENGAGEMENT



24 to 35 during the same period. The number of tenured and tenure-track faculty teaching community-engaged courses rose from 27 in 2020 to 38 in 2022-2023.



In 2022-2023, 22 academic departmentsrepresenting more than half of all departments at SRU-offered community engagement HIPs courses, up from 18 departments in 2020.

This upward trend in student participation, faculty leadership, and departmental involvement demonstrates SRU's ongoing commitment and institutionalization of academic integration and community impact, in alignment with the university's strategic priorities and the CCE's mission.



STRATEGIC GOAL 2: STUDENT EMPOWERMENT

As part of its commitment to student empowerment, CCE continues to deepen the integration of civic engagement into the academic experience. In 2024–2025, the CCE expanded opportunities for experiential learning that promote civic awareness, community involvement, and leadership development.

Signature Initiative: RockServe

RockServe (powered by GivePulse, Inc.), SRU's community engagement digital platform, connects students, faculty, and community partners to service and civic engagement opportunities. The CCE views the tracking and verification of student volunteer hours not merely as a reporting tool, but as a meaningful way to measure the economic impact and community value of student-led initiatives. The RockServe platform enables students and organizations to capture and reflect on their civic contributions through a comprehensive engagement transcript. In 2024–2025, the CCE recorded a 13% increase in student participation in community engagement activities from the previous year. While many students and student organizations participate in community-based projects, increasing registration and use of the platform remains a priority to enhance the visibility, coordination, and impact tracking of our community partnerships.

2024-2025 RockServe Accomplishments

- 115% increase in volunteer opportunities posted by community partners from the previous year.
- 622 SRU students featured on the RockServe Leaderboard.
- The most engaged students participated in sustained, recurring volunteer efforts, demonstrating long-term commitment and deep engagement with their communities.

Note: An "Impact" is a general term on RockServe that describes all types of community engagement activities such as philanthropy, direct service, training, research, voter participation, and reflections.



Partnership between SRU and the Midwestern Intermediate Unit

IWith the generous support of a three-year, \$75,000 grant from the Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV, Slippery Rock University launched a hybrid (remote and in-person) tutoring initiative to support K–12 students in foster care or experiencing housing insecurity. During the 2024–2025 academic year, ten SRU student tutors helped revitalize a key partnership with Emily Brittain Elementary School. Each tutor worked closely with K–12 students—more than 30 in total—providing individualized academic support and building meaningful relationships that strengthen the connection between higher education and local schools.

Civic Action Scorecard


The Civic Action Scorecard is an online civic engagement toolkit used by faculty in their courses, with over 175 experiential opportunities designed to empower SRU students to become civically engaged (University Wide Outcome #7). The Scorecard guides students' civic educational growth, allowing students to earn badges and awards for their efforts, and assists them in creating a portfolio to demonstrate their learning.






Haverlack Civic Scholars

Endowed by the Frank and Margaret Haverlack Good Citizen Scholarship, the <u>Haverlack Civic Scholars program</u> at SRU aims to prepare students for lives of public purpose and engaged citizenship by encouraging actions that enhance both campus and community life. Over four years, Haverlack Civic Scholars develop the ability to engage civically, reflect on their identities, inspire others, and apply civic skills across personal and professional contexts. Students build a civic skillset that includes collaboration, cultural humility, effective communication, and a deep understanding of community issues. The program culminates in a signature project that benefits the community.

2024-2025 Haverlack Civic Scholar Accomplishments

Eight students served as Haverlack Civic Scholars, including **six** who launched the new program model this year.

The Scholars' work blended community service with campus leadership responsibilities.

Together, they engaged **263** unique SRU students in civic activities such as **voting**, **service**, **and community engagement**.

They also completed **145 civic actions**, with **four Scholars** earning the **Silver Civic Action Award**.

A total of **812 hours** of Scholar service generated an estimated **\$25,415** in regional economic impact.

GOAL 3: ENHANCE COMMUNITY-UNIVERSITY PARTNERSHIPS

The CCE is committed to strengthening and sustaining mutually beneficial partnerships with community organizations. This goal will be advanced by establishing long-term, collaborative relationships that support shared objectives and by implementing ongoing, strategic assessment practices. Regularly evaluating and reporting the partnership impact will allow the CCE to continuously refine its strategies and enhance outcomes for both the university and the broader community. We continue to see significant growth in both the number of service opportunities offered by community partners and their use of RockServe. During the 2024–2025 academic year, 770 students participated in service activities in collaboration with community partners. Community partner engagement on RockServe has increased by 47% over the past two years, resulting in a total of 217 posted service opportunities.
