PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Discover the OTD Difference at SRU:

- Dynamic curriculum rooted in evidence-based practice with curricular threads that emphasize collaboration, effectiveness, health and wellness, transferable knowledge and skills, and leadership.
- On-campus didactic instruction with contemporary laboratory and lecture settings
- Off-campus service-learning, fieldwork, and capstone experiences
- Fully accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE®)
- Comprehensive 32-month program

What to expect:

- Spend the first 20 months completing classroom instruction that includes participating in engaging learning experiences to build a strong foundation in occupational therapy theory and practice.
- Apply knowledge and clinical skills for two 12-week fieldwork experiences. SRU offers diverse opportunities for placements within urban and regional hospital settings, school-districts, out-patient pediatric and adult settings, skilled nursing facilities, in-patient rehabilitation units, and more.
- The final semester includes a 14-week doctoral capstone experience that allows students to develop expertise in a designated area of focus through creation of a collaborative project that integrates the site's needs and the student's interests. Findings are then disseminated to provide the student with scholarly presentation experience.

ACCREDITATION/CERTIFICATION/LICENSURE

The entry-level Doctor of Occupational Therapy program at Slippery Rock University is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE®) of the American Occupational Therapy Association. Graduation from an ACOTE® accredited educational program makes one eligible to sit for the certification exam administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT) to become a Registered Occupational Therapist (OTR) and to apply for state licensure in the state(s) in which one wishes to practice.

Professional Licensure Certification: Candidates who have completed the OT program are eligible to be nationally registered after achieving a passing score on the national certification examination. Satisfactory completion of the national certification exam is the first step towards state licensure, which is a different process in each state.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Slippery Rock University OTD program is proud to use a holistic approach to graduate admissions to facilitate diversity within the profession. The following serve as guidelines for student application:

- All applicants should complete the OTCAS (Occupational Therapy Centralized Application Services) application. Applications will be accepted from July 19, 2024, until April 1, 2025. Your OTCAS application must be submitted, completed, and verified by April 1, 2025.
- Applicants must earn a baccalaureate degree or complete the first three years of the SRU 3+3 Pre-Occupational Therapy major by May 2025. Required pre-requisites include:
 - Anatomy & Physiology I & II: two semesters of lecture and laboratory (3-4 credits each)
 - Biomechanics, Kinesiology or Physics: lecture with laboratory (3-4 credits)
 - Statistics (one course) (3-4 credits)
 - Intro to Psychology (3-4 credits)
 - Life Span Human Development or Developmental Psychology (3-4 credits)
 - Abnormal Psychology (3-4 credits)
 - Sociology or Anthropology (one course in either area) (3-4 credits)
 - Research Methods: an undergraduate introductory or intermediate research course (3-4 credits) other research coursework will be considered on a case-by-case basis
 - Medical Terminology (1 credit)
- Observation Hours: 12 or more observation hours of occupational therapy services provided by a licensed occupational therapist or assistant. Specific details and hours must be documented and verified with the practitioner's signature. A tracking form is available on the SRU OT website.
- Minimum GPA Requirement: 3.0 cumulative GPA (Students with a GPA below 3.0 may apply for conditional admission).
- Personal reflection statement on interest in occupational therapy as a profession
- Three professional letters of reference: Examples include letters from a former instructor, employer, mentor, or volunteer supervisor

Additional pre-requisite considerations:

- Students with questions regarding pre-requisites are encouraged to contact the program director for a personalized review
- All pre-requisite courses must have been taken within the last 10 years and completed with a C grade (2.0) or higher
- AP/IB courses are only accepted for Intro to Psychology
- Credits for coursework or experiential learning completed at another occupational therapy program will not be accepted

NOTES:

Accepted applicants will receive notification through an offer letter at which time the student must submit a non-refundable \$500 deposit. This deposit applies to tuition and must be submitted within 2 weeks to hold a seat in the upcoming class.

The following are necessary throughout the duration of the program*:

- Access to a laptop
- Ability to perform technical standards; please visit the website to view current requirements for occupational therapy students.
- Access to reliable transportation for both academic, fieldwork, and doctoral capstone experiences for distances of up to 75 miles one way
- Maintenance of health and liability insurance
- Proficiency in the English language

*Conviction of misdemeanor, felony or felonious or illegal act may prevent the student from becoming credentialed and/or licensed to practice in field of occupational therapy.
