MARIJUANA Use Among Full-Time College Students and Non-College Peers Remains a Concern










Past Month

NICOTINE Use is Generally Lower in College Students


CIGARETTES

Past-Month Use



Past-year hookah use is lower among college students, trending down in the past five years.


