ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

All applicants must submit the following materials along with a completed online graduate application and non-refundable application fee of \$35.00:

- Copy of Teaching Certificate (optional)
- A 300-500 word essay indicating personal and professional goals (follow all APA formatting)
- A writing sample: Applicants can submit an example of a special education focused sample from your graduate program or a one - to two-page, single-spaced essay addressing one of the following topics (include the prompt that you choose at the top of your essay and follow all APA formatting)
 - 1. Why should a society provide a "free and appropriate" education to students with disabilities who will not be able to achieve academic or other skills at the same level as students without disabilities?
 - 2. Describe your position on the inclusion of students with disabilities in general education. What are the benefits of inclusion and the potential barriers?
- Two Letters of Recommendation addressing the applicant's academic and/or professional background as it relates to special education
- Candidate must have earned an undergraduate degree in elementary education, special education, early childhood, secondary (English, science, social studies, psychology, business, or core content knowledge)
- Official bachelor's and master's degree transcripts, doctorate, if applicable. (bachelor's degree with at least 3.0 GPA and master's degree with at least 3.5 GPA)

Preference is given to applicants in the order in which the application is received.
